ALL YOU EVER WANTED TO KNOW BUT NEVER DARED ASK

Many horse people have questions come up every once in a while they can't answer. Here's a question I received from a CFHA member and the answer given by horse nutritionist Jim Lewis.

QUESTION: "My horse suffers from chronic diarrhoea. I've tried just about everything with little success. Any ideas?"

JIM LEWIS: Here's an old remedy to try. I have found it to work in many cases of chronic diarrhoea. I first heard of it from old-time horsemen who didn't always have a Give your horse 100 ml vet available. (about 3 ounces) per day of tincture of strawberry. You can mix it in wheat bran. There is no danger in using it and it's available at a pharmacy. If the problem is still there at the end of a week, I would consult a vet. I see many horses these days with weak intestinal flora and a lack of the ability to produce enzymes. A more modern remedy to try is Equinal Zyme, which contains live cell yeast and digestive enzymes.
